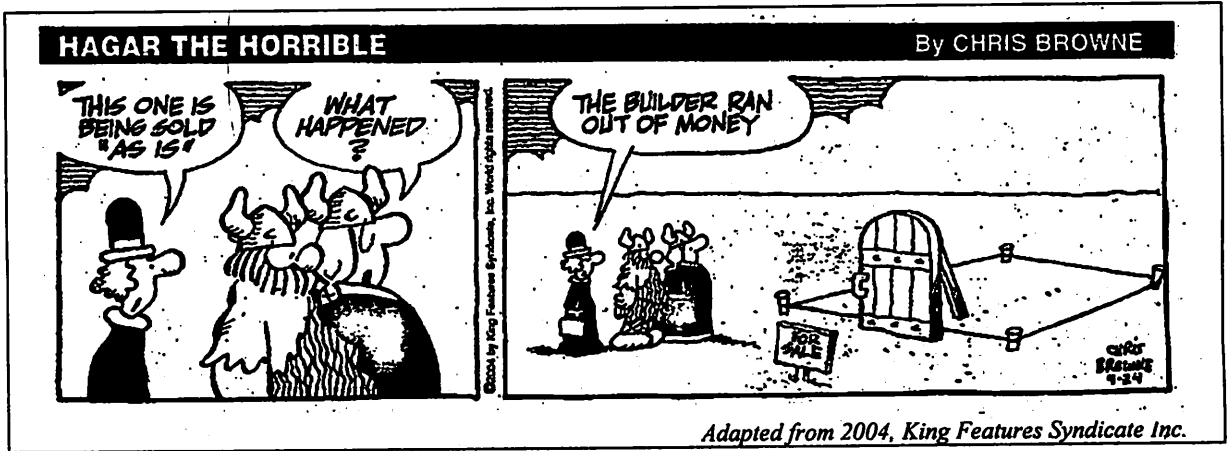
Its officials made the discovery when they carried out a Detailed Environment Impact Assessment (DEIA) report last year for de-silting activities in the lake.

Police have classified the case as an accident and are investigating to determine the cause.

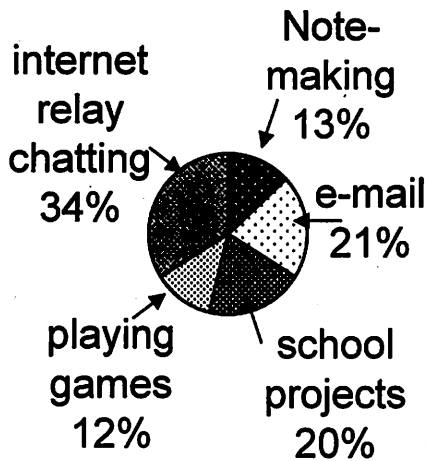

Situated about 70km from Kota Bharu, Kuala Krai was not easily reached by car in the old days, even up to the 9 1980s, as the trunk road from Kuala Lumpur ended at Pahang's Kuala Lipis. 10 is about 200km away. Those adamant about driving there would have to take a very long way by 11 through Kuantan and Kuala Terengganu, and then doubling back down after reaching Machang.

Instead, the railway was the only practical means 12 travelling from Kuala Lumpur to Gua Musang, Kuala Krai and even Kota Bharu. Given its rather remote location, it is no exaggeration to say that Kuala Krai owed much of its past prosperity to the east coast railway that stretches from Gemas in Johor to its end point at Tumpat, located near the Kelantan-Thai border.

However, the 13 of rail declined in the mid 1980s with the completion of 14 100km-long Gua Musang-Kuala Lipis highway which today forms part of Federal Route 8.

While Kuala Krai is a 15 drive from Kuala Lumpur, you can always leave the car at home as the more interesting way to see the place is to take a train ride, which takes you through endless miles of calming greenery.

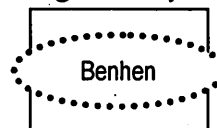

- 1 At 6.30 a.m. February 16, Art Aguilar slowly eased the huge, empty school bus along muddy Granger Road. He touched the brakes and stopped in front of a white farm house.
- 2 Scott Vana, 11, saw the lights of the bus. Joshua, four years younger, grabbed his coat and Tammara, 5, leaned away from the last swipe of her mother's comb. It was raining lightly but in seconds, the kids were moving down the dark driveway and up the metal steps of the empty bus. Scott ambled to the rear seat. Joshua and Tammara sat talking near the front, their laughter rising and falling. 05
- 3 Just over three kilometres from the Vana house, the road dipped sharply to a low-water crossing at Childress Creek. This morning Childress Creek was running faster and higher than usual. Just to be cautious, Aguilar stopped the bus a few metres away to scan the area. The crossing was completely covered by water but the vehicle, at roughly 12 tonnes, should have no trouble with a few centimetres of water. Settling back in his seat; he shifted into low gear and crawled onto the crossing. The heavy bus moved easily through the water. The other side was less than a bus-length away. *No problem*, he thought. 10
- 4 But then, almost instantly, water was over the tyres, lapping against the black school lettering. The rear of the bus slipped on the algae-slick concrete. In seconds it was loose on the flood, floating backwards into the darkness. The Vana kids were screaming. Aguilar clung to his seat as the bus rolled deeply to the right as if trying to dump him out the door. If it rolled all the way over, they were dead. 15
- 5 Aguilar wrested himself from behind the steering wheel. The kids were on the edge of panic, their frightened voices cutting through the sound of the rushing water. "Stay steady! Stand on your seats," Aguilar called as he waded the water sweeping up the aisle. The children grew quiet and scrambled up to stand on the vinyl-covered benches. Water swirled up to the seat cushions. 20
- 6 The lumbering bus floated backwards downstream until it lodged on a submerged gravel bar. Debris-laden water gushed through cracks in the closed doors, forcing its way through the bus. Aguilar grabbed the mobile phone from beside the driver's seat and pushed the emergency number. But inside the bus, he got only static. 25
- 7 Aguilar feared that the water would fill the bus. Then he remembered the roof hatch in the middle of the bus. He stood on a seat and cranked it open. Gently he picked up Tammara. He stood up on the seat and lifted the tiny girl carefully through the hatch. He told her to stay still on the top. Scott helped Aguilar boost Joshua out, and then grabbed the edge of the hatch and scrambled through himself. The driver took a quick look around – the bus was half full of water. He struggled through the tight opening. 30
- 8 Aguilar tried the cell phone again. Outside the bus, the call went through. He told the police their location. Now he and the children had to wait – clothes soaked, shivering in the wind on the cold, slick metal roof. Joshua's imagination was working overtime. He envisioned alligators in the water. Aguilar tried to reassure the kids, but the water was still rising. 35
- 9 In the distance, Derek Mitchell swung his Black Hawk helicopter low out of the mist. Though the rain had stopped, Mitchell's Black Hawk created a storm of its own – a 180 kilometre-per-hour downdraught that bent trees and sent mud and gravel flying. Quickly he 40

signalled to Aguilar and the children to get back inside the bus.

- 10 Aguilar dropped down through the hatch, landing in icy water. Scott and Joshua lowered Tammara to him. Next Joshua swung inside, followed by Scott. Standing on the seats, soaked and cold, they waited for the chopper to get into position. 45
- 11 Twenty metres above, the Black Hawk buffeted the bus with its downdraught. Then there was a thump on the metal roof. Aguilar looked up and saw a wet face. He grabbed Tammara and lifted the girl to the man's outstretched hands. The pilot and the hoist operator deftly extracted the soldier with Tammara and landed them safely in a nearby field. Mitchell's team made each rescue faster. Joshua was next. It took less than a minute to retrieve Scott. 50
Shortly the Black Hawk returned and pulled Aguilar out of the half-sunken wreck.
