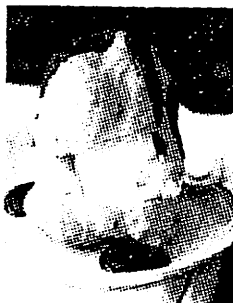

**Joanna's Deli**

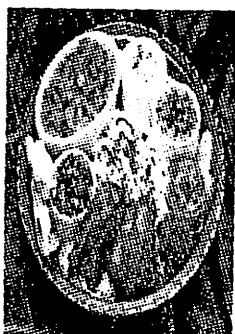
This is the place for the best custard puffs for they are big and fluffy. The choux paste is light and airy and the filling is just superb. This shop has a new feel although it has been around for nearly 50 years. The cafe also serves the popular *ice kacang* which comes in a riot of colours. This is a recommended item.

**Warung Sri Aidah**

On weekends, this place offers *nasi bryani* and *nasi tomato* accompanied by meat dishes. The well-known dish here is *nasi kandar*, available daily. There are also arrays of traditional northern-style *kuih* including *bengkang*, *apam manis* and *serabai*. The curries are cooked with skimmed milk and the senior citizens (above 60 years) dine at a discount.

**Mambo Grilled Seafood**

To find this open-air outlet, follow the smoke from the grill. The selection is limited but there is ample supply of prawns, squids and stingrays. Customers can choose from three sauces of varying degrees of spiciness to go with seafood. Service is fast where it takes less than 15 minutes for your food to arrive.

**Surya Indian Cuisine**

Surya Indian Cuisine is one of the most elegant places for Indian dining. What is highly recommended here is the Indian dinner set which offers assorted *pakoras*, vegetarian *samosas*, chutney, Kashmiri chicken curry, mixed vegetables, *chapatti* and rice. Another item on the menu worth trying is the tangy *Nimbu Pani*.

Questions 26-31 are based on the following passage.

The passage is about how Kaping and his family produce salt in Bali.

- 1 It is 6 a.m. and after a few quick sips of the strong local coffee, 48-year-old Kaping prepares for another day of arduous work by the sea. Like his father and his father's father before him, Kaping is carrying on the age-old job of making salt that's remained virtually unchanged for many generations in the sleepy village near Goa Lawah on Bali's eastern coast. 5

- 2 In the dim early morning light with buckets filled with sea water, he wades through the waves to return to the beach. Kaping heads for the plots of sand that he has carefully raked earlier. There, he swings his buckets back and forth, spilling the sea water onto the sand with each rocking motion. He walks forwards and backwards through these entire plots until the buckets are emptied. Kaping is sowing the ground with these "seeds" from the sea. Using this gruelling method, it takes him at least 40 such trips to and from the sea to drench the plots. Then he waits for the sun to do its part. 10

- 3 Kaping's eyes carefully search the skies for any signs of rain – even a few drops can spell trouble. A gust of wind can send stray debris that will also affect his drying plots. Kaping would not be idle while he waits. He and his family supplement their income by collecting small black pebbles on the beach and sell them for use in building construction which is especially important in the rainy season when salt-making comes to a standstill. 15

- 4 By midday, Kaping, assisted by his wife, Wati, 37, and his mother-in-law, Ibu Dewa, 80, harvests the salt. This is done when the sea water has evaporated. He uses a rake to break up the sun-baked sand into crispy black shards glittering with raw salt crystals. He arranges the debris into neat piles with a huge wooden scraper, and then he scoops them into round woven bamboo containers. His wife and mother-in-law unload the contents into a big wooden tub in the hut nearby. 20

- 5 Kaping then, fills two big plastic buckets with sea water that he stored overnight in wooden barrels on the ground level of the hut. Climbing up a slope made of two coconut tree trunks, he pours the stored sea water onto the sand in the big tub until the barrels below are empty. The saltwater undergoes stages of rest and leaching for up to three days to ensure all sediments are removed. 25

- 6 For the final evaporation process, Kaping and his family place the saltwater in coconut tree trunks that have been cut in half. After this, he places the crystals inside bamboo tankards for further drainage. The produced salt grains are then painstakingly sifted and graded by hand before making their way to markets near and far. 30

- 7 Hardy and stoic is exactly what Kaping is about his chosen job. Kaping used to be a fisherman, but the rising costs of fuel and fishing equipment brought him back to his father's trade that is salt farming. "What's important now are my 35

children. What I earn is enough to support their schooling. I don't know how to do anything else." He is resigned to the fact that neither his son nor his daughter wants anything to do with the family enterprise. "They don't want to work with salt. Even during their school holidays they don't want to help. I hope I'm able to work until they finish their schooling," he explains. 40
